The **Clean Water Festival** will take place on Saturday, October 15th—the weekend prior to the 50th Anniversary of the Clean Water Act on October 18th, 2022. This festival is free and open to the public.

PWSA is also hosting an all-employee volunteering event and picnic on October 29th to celebrate this historic milestone. In partnership with Allegheny Cleanways and Friends of the Riverfront, PWSA employees have the opportunity to participate in river- and land-based cleanups along the Monogahela River, giving back to our community in ways that align with our mission. Following the volunteering event – which is open to all employees and their families – we'll all gather in the park for an afternoon of food and fun to celebrate PWSA, the work we've accomplished, our commitment to providing our region with vital water services.

The Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority (PWSA) will soon participate in various events in recognition of the 50th anniversary of the Clean Water Act—an important piece of legislation passed in 1972 to protect our waterways from pollution and regulate surface water quality in the United States.

not thrive. Pittsburgh has come a long way since its three rivers used to be open sewers for industry and sewage, and there is still work left to do. With an emphasis on the environment, PWSA is committed to protecting local water quality while serving as steadfast stewards of the water services you rely on each day.

WATER WISE

Keep Leaves Out of Storm Drains!



Actions you take in your yard impact our sewers, streams, and rivers.

Leaves and grass clippings left on the ground can clog storm drains and sewer pipes, contributing to street flooding when it rains. Fertilizers and yard waste can also cause nutrient pollution and oxygen depletion in our streams and rivers when carried through storm drains and sewers. This hurts our waterways and the fish and wildlife that rely on them.

Help protect our water and sewer resources:

- Do not rake or blow leaves or grass clippings into the street.
- Do not dump yard waste or trash near or into storm drains.
- Place your leaves in a bag for curbside yard debris collection or compost them at home.
- If you have a mulching lawnmower, use it to recycle leaves and their nutrients into your lawn.
- Only apply fertilizers or pesticides if necessary and do not overapply.
- Select slow-release and organic fertilizers, which are less likely to wash away.
- Fertilize lawns in the fall to prevent nutrients washing away during spring rains.
